

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Slackers in any endeavor, but particularly in the world of business, are forthrightly told by their bosses to "get with the program." There is an implied "or else" in their directive. Immediate compliance is the only alternative. No time for a listing of offenses. The slacker now knows that he has been watched; his behavior noted; this reform essential to the overall success of the operation.

In today's Scriptures, particularly the well-known Gospel passage about the Beatitudes Jesus gives notice to the world, and also His Church, of His program for salvation. It is a way of life. Without being explicit, Our Lord's beatitudes leave up to our discernment what refusal to comply will yield us.

The first few of the eight are special components of Jesus' mission to Israel. They are essential, and free of any later add-on by the nascent Church. Do you see why the Church in our time claims "a preferential option for the poor?" And that the option is basic?

Poverty in all its dimensions is an evil. The financial aspect of course comes to our minds first, perhaps because we are part of a culture of consumers. Consuming costs money. Amazon sends a bill. But there is also a poverty of education, of proper life goals and behaviors, and of generosity of heart.

Hunger stalks this land of plenty we live on, but it haunts our overfed routine. Mourning grows more widespread in the way elements of our society have cheapened life itself. It is a violent world we live in now, as people use weapons to express anger, jealousy, hate and revenge. We have managed to create almost a "sub-society" of mourners in our midst. These three negatives obviously get the bulk of divine attention. The Scriptures urge you and me today to do the same. How? In genuine, consistent outreach in both prayer and practical decisions of assistance. No slackers allowed.

A bold commentator wrote this about the Apostles' reaction to hearing the beatitudes:

Then Simon Peter said, "Are we supposed to know this?" And Andrew said, "Do we have to write this down?"

And Andrew said, "Do we have to write this down?"

And James said, "Will we get a test on this?"

And Philip said, "I don't have any paper." And Bartholomew said, "Do we have to turn it in?"

And John said, "The other disciples don't have to learn this."

And Matthew said, "I have to go to the bathroom."

And Judas said, "What does this have to do with real life?"

And one of the Pharisees present asked to see Jesus' lesson plans, and inquired of Jesus, "What is your terminal objective? Have you completed a task analysis? What about a diagnostic survey?" And Jesus wept.

I was visiting the Level Three classroom to recognize them for all getting 100% on their midterm evaluation, and I had asked them what made their teacher such a good teacher. Then I asked her what made them such great students. She said that they taught her something every week (like patience) and they had great questions. We agreed that they were "rock star" students and as a reward they each got to pick out a rock from a collection that one of the Sisters had decorated with religious symbols.

You might be wondering what the treasure box they enjoyed so much had in it. It has little toys and religious articles. Each time the class achieves a goal that the catechist has set for them, they all get a turn to pick something out of the treasure box. She shared that recently a boy had skipped the hot wheels cars and picked out a container shaped like a lamb with the Act of Contrition on it. These kids are learning, laughing, and growing in their faith. They are better than rock stars!



We often have ideas of religious life... either kneeling in a convent or out in the streets assisting the poor. While both of these scenes are essential to the life as a sister, Light of Love takes a deeper look into understanding the call... the "why" of religious life. By interviewing five sisters from five orders across the United States, the film places viewers face to face in intimate conversations with these amazing women. What does it mean to be called? What are the struggles of religious life? How have you seen God move through your ministry? These questions and others are addressed throughout the film.

The film itself is very simple: 60 minutes designed for viewers to quiet their surroundings and enter into convent, the food pantry, the hospital, and the chapel. With minimal music and simple visuals, Light of Love gives viewers a look into the lives, suffering, and joys of religious life captured in a way like never before. Dear Parish Family,

We are privileged to be called by God the Father to gather as His people for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, through Jesus Christ, and in the power of the Holy Spirit. The sacrificial nature of the Mass, solemnly defended by the Council of Trent, and pronounced by the Second Vatican Council, stated: "At the Last Supper, Our Savior instituted the Eucharistic Sacrifice of his Body and Blood, by which the Sacrifice of his Cross is perpetuated until he comes again; and till then he entrusts the memorial of his Death and Resurrection to his beloved spouse, the Church." We believe, that whenever we gather for Mass, whether Sunday or weekday, "... the memorial of this sacrifice is celebrated, and the work of our redemption is accomplished" (the ancient Sacramentary commonly called the Leonine).

During this time of our Archdiocesan Phase of the Eucharistic Revival, I would like to learn from your experience and wisdom on three basic questions about the liturgies at our Churches:

- 1) What suggestions can make our liturgies more vibrant for your spiritual growth?
- 2) How can we increase Mass attendance?
- 3) Do you have any other suggestions that would strengthen our parish?

I invite you to pray and reflect on these questions. Then come, share the fruit of your reflection with me on Sunday, February 5, 2023, as part of Hospitality Sunday, after the 10AM Mass at St. Charles Borromeo Church, in the Parish Hall. We can have coffee, some Danish, and have a dialogue about these matters for our good. If you cannot come that Sunday, please feel free to email your reflections to me at <u>mmajoros@scbdh.org</u>. Service to God and His Church:

God is always calling us to a new and more abundant life in His Church. If you are feeling the promptings of the Holy Spirit, inspiring you to place your talents and abilities at the service of God and His Church, please consider the following areas and then contact the rectory office:

Ushers and Greeters: There is a serious need for men and women to serve as greeters and collectors at our weekend Masses at both Churches.

Altar Servers: There is a great need for men, women and young persons to serve at the Altar for weekend Masses, and other Masses and Liturgies (Funeral, Weddings, Special Occasions) at both Churches. Lectors: There is always room for additional men, women and young persons to serve as good readers and proclaimers of the Word of God at our weekend Masses and Special Celebrations. Interested parishioners will be required to take part in a training through a workshop conducted by the Archdiocesan Office of Worship.

Extraordinary minister of Holy Communion: There is always room for additional men, women and young persons to serve as Extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to bring Holy Communion to the Sick and Homebound of the parish, and when needed, to distribute Holy Communion at the scheduled Masses. Interested parishioners will be required to be interviewed by the Pastor, and then to take part in a training conducted by Archdiocesan Office of Worship.
