

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Pope Francis recently commended the good work of the **Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD)**, "which is celebrating 50 years of helping poor communities in the U.S. to live more worthily by promoting their participation in decisions that affect them." The Holy Father explains that the mission of CCHD is to "accompany people in their struggle for 'la tierra, el techo y el trabajo' [land, work and housing], and to stand by them when they encounter attitudes of opposition and contempt." Francis notes that the economic impact of the pandemic have made this work "that much more urgent and necessary." These words from our Holy Father call us to genuine concern for and relationship with the poor and marginalized members of our larger society and local communities. As faithful Catholics, we follow in the footsteps of Jesus, who demonstrated a deep love for the poor and forgotten people of his day. Like Christ, we too must have a heart for those who lack the basic necessities of life which everyone deserves.

With this in mind, I invite your ongoing support of our annual CCHD collection, which will occur at Masses next weekend (July 3-4). As the domestic anti-poverty program of the U.S. Catholic Bishops, CCHD supports community groups to address the root causes of poverty by enabling the most vulnerable members of our community a chance to build a brighter future for themselves and their families. In our country today, over 37 million people are still living in poverty, and Philadelphia ranks highest in poverty amongst the largest U.S. cities, with over 23% of its residents living below the poverty line. Many also suffer from educational deficits, language barriers, substance abuse, incarceration, and health challenges. Through CCHD funding, the following good works were supported in our region last year:

- Catholic immigrants from Africa and Asia attended leadership development retreats and webinars an electronics recycling program trained and hired the formerly incarcerated who struggle to find a job a fresh choice pantry provided free fresh produce, meats and dairy in the Kensington "food desert" an immigration services project provided legal and interpretation services in Southwest Philadelphia a community outreach program provided ESL, GED and SAT classes to poor Norristown residents group homes in Philadelphia supported formerly homeless people in recovery from substance abuse a volunteer mentoring and support network offered long term support for persons with HIV/AIDS a Philadelphia parish outreach purchased tents and equipment to serve meals outdoors during COVID we may not know them personally, but these are not strangers to us. They are our brothers and sisters who need us to stand with them as they strive to achieve living conditions worthy of their inherent God given human dignity.

## ***Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time***

### ***Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson***

"People are difficult." I smile as I recall the story of a long gone Philly auxiliary bishop who reportedly used those exact words in reaction to not receiving the desired condiment at his lunch table where sat an impressionable seminarian. Pity the cook at the time. A more general agreement with that statement would surely come to any car driver who has been followed for miles by a tail hater who just won't pass.

In both of today's Gospel stories of Jesus' compassionate healing, we receive proof of people's occasional perfidy. In the first story, a poor woman suffering from a 12 year long affliction of hemorrhages we learn has been bankrupted by a series of "many doctors" who added "greatly" to her pains. What an indictment of the then existing medical profession! And this many centuries before many cases of Medicare fraud! Our Lord beautifully counterbalances all that negativity with His cure and His smiling compliment paid to the lady about her faith and then His comforting sendoff: "Go in peace."

Turning to the second story of Jairus' daughter's healing, placed as the "bread" of the "Scriptural sandwich," we meet a "large crowd" of naysayers ready for ridicule after Jesus tells Jairus not to be afraid and "just have faith." A bit later, when Jesus declared that the 12 year old was merely "asleep," What was the herd reaction? Mockery. Of course, after the healing of the girl, most of those same onlookers had to "eat their words." I'm sure that brought a sour taste as they became, in Mark's words, "utterly astounded."

Reflecting on all of this, it strikes me how serene Our Savior remained all throughout the two encounters with both sickness and sour people. All He did was ask two gentle questions: "Who touched Me?" and "Why this commotion?" You notice that He knew His power as God. Well did He also know that it was sin, "the envy of the devil," that brought sickness and death into the world. As a result, He had to tell people that faith in Him is the ultimate cure of our ills. From a human perspective I imagine that the crowd's shameful behavior must have hurt Him. Yet even that did not distract Him from His mission of healing sick sisters and brothers.

When mockery is made of our Catholic beliefs in the public square what do you do? Shudder into submission? Or do you push back? Jesus tells us today not to be afraid and "just have faith."

Some years ago, Dr. Kent M. Keith wrote "Anyway: The Paradoxical Commandments." They echo the gospel message. They answer the fact that "people are difficult." Here is the good doctor's list:

- People are illogical, unreasonable and self-centered. Love them anyway.
- If you do good, people will accuse you of selfish ulterior motives. Do good anyway.
- If you are successful, you win false friends and true enemies. Succeed anyway.
- The good you do today will be forgotten tomorrow. Do good anyway.
- Honesty and frankness make you vulnerable. Be honest and frank anyway.
- The biggest people with the biggest ideas can be shot down by the smallest people with the smallest minds. Think big anyway.
- People favor underdogs, but follow only top dogs. Fight for the underdog anyway.
- What you spend years building may be destroyed overnight. Build anyway.
- People really need help but may attack you if you do help them. Help people anyway.
- Give the world the best you have and you'll get kicked in the teeth. Give the world the best you have anyway.

God love you and give you His peace.
