

The Fourth Week of Lent

With this week, we begin the second part of Lent. We ask more and more deeply to be with and like Jesus. We desire to celebrate the approaching mystery of our salvation with greater freedom and greater joy. Each day's gospel will now be from the Gospel according to John. We can't avoid the feeling of being in a court room for a grand trial. There are "witnesses" and "testimony." It is a battle between the forces of Darkness and the Light. The opposition to Jesus mounts. It is inevitable that he will be killed. But, we know that the ultimate Judgment in the trial is against Sin and Death. We grow in gratitude and grace as we experience more deeply that this is all "for me."

Lenten Patterns: Practicing Penance

When you sprain your ankle, part of the healing process will involve physical therapy. It's tender, and perhaps it is swollen. It may be important to put ice on it first, to reduce the inflammation. You may want to wrap it and elevate it and stay off of it. Then you will need to start moving it and then walking on it, and eventually, as the injury is healed, you will want to start exercising it, so that it will be stronger than it was before, so that you won't as easily injure it again. Penance is a remedy, a medicine, a spiritual therapy for the healing you desire. The Lord always forgives us. We are forgiven without condition. But complete healing takes time. With serious sin or with bad habits we've invested years in forming, we need to develop a therapeutic care plan to let the healing happen. To say "I'm sorry" or to simply make a "resolution" to change a long established pattern, will have the same bad result as wishing a sprained ankle would heal, while still walking on it. Lent is a wonderful time to name what sinful, unhealthy, self-centered patterns need changing and to act against them by coming up with a strategy. Lasting healing needs the practice of penance. Putting It All Together - Alone and With Others In the end, the prayer of St. Augustine places us in the right spirit for Lent: O Lord, our Lord, you have created us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest in you. Lent is indeed how God draws us home, as individuals. But, it is also a very communal journey. We never journey alone, no matter how "lonely" we may feel. We are always journeying together. If we can experience our journey in communion with others, it makes it so much clearer that we are on a journey together. When you can share your experience with even one other close friend, or with your regular worshiping community, you can enjoy and share the support and environment that allows grace to flourish. Let us pray for each other on this journey, especially those who need and desire a change of heart on this pilgrimage to Easter joy.

Fourth Sunday of Lent

Last Christmas I watched part of a holiday concert held in New York City by Andrea Bocelli accompanied by his talented son and daughter. They joined the New York Singing City choir for several carols of the season. Naturally the power and beauty of the renowned tenor's voice dominated the performances. As we know, Bocelli is blind. But that has no effect on his singing and his mastery of several musical instruments. He brings joy to audiences all over the world. I could say he is a point of light in the darkness of the world.

We are not told of any special talent held by the blind man in our gospel story from John chosen for this Lenten Sunday. We know that he was deprived of sight from his birth, unable to enjoy the world that we so easily do. But because of Jesus' compassionate healing, he is suddenly brought into the ranks of the "children of light."

But like what frequently happens when Jesus works a miracle, so here too the Pharisee onlookers, representing the usual cynics among us, begin a series of hair-splitting maneuvers involving the Law. They devise calculated threats, upsetting the man's parents along the way, all done to counter the good news in what they witnessed. Of course our evangelist wants us recognize the fact that they are the real blind men.

True, in a world lit only by fire, the unnamed blind man's affliction was doubly painful. Even for his sighted peers, when the sun went down the world could be a dangerous place. But at least they could see each other's faces by oil lamplight. Or follow a path with ease. Blindness was mostly a burden. Some saw it as a curse. Yet the love of family was always there to help.

Flash forward across the centuries, and we can understand why the Church presents us with this story at the midpoint of Lent. We have a potent reminder that we can all be blind to our own sins at times. But we also have the occasion this day to be joyful not only because we have Christ's light available to see where we need correction and a Sacrament of confession to affect our healing.

In the meantime we have another life lesson as illustrated by the story of Samuel. Here is a good man, a prophet, but he has to learn that he does not see as God sees. Ah, and so do we! When we experience the twists and turns of life here below; the natural disasters that ruin our calm; and the personal setbacks that torture our confidence, we need not let them rob us of our hope. A hope based not in just any person, place, or thing but in our resurrected Lord.

Say the word

"God is here!" the little girl next to me proclaimed during the middle of Mass, pointing to the front of the Church. Her mother and I looked at her with surprise. "What do you mean?" I whispered. "I see the light, so God is here," she said matter of factly. (I had told her two weeks before that when we see the red candles, it means that Jesus is present in the Church.) A couple minutes later she wanted to know where God was in the Church. It was time for the distribution of Holy Communion, so I pointed out all the people in line and said that they were going up to the front and the man in front was giving them something that looked like bread, but is really God. She didn't look so certain, but she watched me get in line with interest on her face.

It's amazing what children pick up and what they remember (and what they don't remember:). Let's keep planting those seeds and following up with the little ones in our lives.

Prayers for PREP

Jesus in the Eucharist, may our parishes' children come to Church with a sense of wonder, open to Your presence in their lives. Amen.
